<p align="center">State</p> <p align="center">Proposal 18-1 A proposed initiated law to authorize and legalize possession, use and cultivation of marijuana products by individuals who are at least 21 years of age and older, and commercial sales of marijuana through state-licensed retailers</p> <p>This proposal would:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Allow individuals 21 and older to purchase, possess and use marijuana and marijuana-infused edibles, and grow up to 12 marijuana plants for personal consumption. • Impose a 10-ounce limit for marijuana kept at residences and require amounts over 2.5 ounces be secured in locked containers. • Create a state licensing system for marijuana businesses and allow municipalities to ban or restrict them. • Permit retail sales of marijuana and edibles subject to a 10% tax, dedicated to implementation costs, clinical trials, schools, roads, and municipalities where marijuana businesses are located. • Change several current violations from crimes to civil infractions. <p>Should this proposal be adopted?</p> <p align="right">Yes <input type="radio"/></p> <p align="right">No <input type="radio"/></p>	<p align="center">Proposal 18-3 A proposal to authorize automatic and Election Day voter registration, no-reason absentee voting, and straight ticket voting; and add current legal requirements for military and overseas voting and post-election audits to the Michigan Constitution</p> <p>This proposed constitutional amendment would allow a United States citizen who is qualified to vote in Michigan to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Become automatically registered to vote when applying for, updating or renewing a driver's license or state-issued personal identification card, unless the person declines. • Simultaneously register to vote with proof of residency and obtain a ballot during the 2-week period prior to an election, up to and including Election Day. • Obtain an absent voter ballot without providing a reason. • Cast a straight-ticket vote for all candidates of a particular political party when voting in a partisan general election. <p>Should this proposal be adopted?</p> <p align="right">Yes <input type="radio"/></p> <p align="right">No <input type="radio"/></p>
<p align="center">Proposal 18-2 A proposed constitutional amendment to establish a commission of citizens with exclusive authority to adopt district boundaries for the Michigan Senate, Michigan House of Representatives and U.S. Congress, every 10 years</p> <p>This proposed constitutional amendment would:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Create a commission of 13 registered voters randomly selected by the Secretary of State: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 4 each who self-identify as affiliated with the 2 major political parties; and • 5 who self-identify as unaffiliated with major political parties. • Prohibit partisan officeholders and candidates, their employees, certain relatives, and lobbyists from serving as commissioners. • Establish new redistricting criteria including geographically compact and contiguous districts of equal population, reflecting Michigan's diverse population and communities of interest. Districts shall not provide disproportionate advantage to political parties or candidates. • Require an appropriation of funds for commission operations and commissioner compensation. <p>Should this proposal be adopted?</p> <p align="right">Yes <input type="radio"/></p> <p align="right">No <input type="radio"/></p>	<p align="center">County</p> <p align="center">Benzie County School Resource Officer Program Operating Millage Proposal</p> <p>For the purpose of paying the cost of enhancing law enforcement presence in both school districts in Benzie County, specifically for funding two (2) School Resource Officers, and necessary equipment and training, to be provided in both Benzie County school districts, shall the tax limitation imposed under Article IX, Sec. 6 of the Michigan Constitution on the general ad valorem taxes within the County of Benzie, Michigan, be increased, and shall the County be authorized to levy up to 0.1800 mills (\$0.1800 per \$1,000 of taxable value) for a period of four (4) years (2018-2021), inclusive?</p> <p>If approved and levied in full, this millage would raise an estimated \$226,526 for two School Resource Officers operating purposes in the first calendar year.</p> <p>As required by State law, a small portion of the millage may be captured by and disbursed to the City of Frankfort Downtown Development Authority and Benzie County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority.</p> <p align="right">Yes <input type="radio"/></p> <p align="right">No <input type="radio"/></p>
